But we're most excited to see what's unleashed by Bank, the London artists' collaborative who've made it their mission to take the piss out of the YBA hullabaloo (their exhibition space, for instance, is called Gallerie Poo-Poo)

Also on view: Dale Wittig, Jane Kaplowitz and Karen Kilimnik, who's long been fascinated with the Russian Revolution (see her concurrent show at 303 Gallery). In a time when art itself is being glossed over with pretty faces and neo-pop paintings, this show should be a breath of fresh air. —[Julie Caniglia](#)
